Dr. John May, a researcher at the New Yor Agricultural Medicine and Health in Coopers study in his state points to the severity of the problem.

"In our screening of 338 randomly selected New York farmers, we have found hearing loss in 77%," he notes. "We view hearing loss as a major occupational health issue for farmers."

Ironically, noise-induced hearing loss starts silently. By the time those around you notice you can't hear as well, the damage may be irreversible.

Here are two important steps you can take to ensure you won't be robbed of this important sense.

First, try to control the sound around you. Make sure machine parts are well-lubricated. Repair or replace worn, loose or unbalanced chains, belts and other parts. Exchange out faulty mufflers, using replacements that meet or exceed the manufacturer's recommendations. Whenever possible, use machines that have cabs and keep windows closed.

Second, reduce your exposure to sounds. Earmuffs and earplugs block dangerous sounds but still allow you to hear.

Whatever form of hearing protection you choose, look for a noise reduction rating of 25 or higher. Also, read the label and be sure to follow the directions for proper use.
